NETBALL MAINLAND END OF FINANCIAL YEAR 2017/18 AND BUDGET 2019

Our end of financial year, 30 November 2018, has rolled around and our accounts will be audited in the middle of January 2019, for presentation at our AGM, on 16 March 2019.

A draft budget has been approved by the Board of Netball Mainland (NM) and has now been submitted to Netball New Zealand (NNZ) for final approval/sign off and integration into their accounting system.

Trip to Tonga under the Pacific Sporting Partnership Programme - NetGo

In a follow up to my earlier trip this year, I was lucky enough to be back for an eight-day whirl wind visit to Tonga. The days started at 6.00 a.m. for the first session, every day except Sunday, as Sunday is a day for rest and worship.

The first two days were about 'Player Centered' coaching and 'Teaching Games for Understanding' (master coaching). Netball in Tonga has been very drill based, the 'Australian way' for a long time. There were 20 players and eight to ten coaches in attendance and after day two the coaches took over the activities while the coach developers that I had been involved with on my last visit, started to work with the coaches. This has been one of the sticking points with the coach developer programme, as the coach developers are so new to coaching themselves and then we are asking them to develop other coaches too. It really means a flexible approach is needed.

Next, we headed off to the schools that have "NetGo" being delivered to them from 12.00 p.m. to 4.00 p.m. I was lucky enough to meet seven of the nine principals involved in the NetGo program. They are very passionate about having some organised and supported sport in their schools and are happy to band together to ask the hard questions of the Ministry.

Visiting the village schools would be the most rewarding part of my visit; the children have nothing, expect nothing but glow when you give them time. The first school had the best set up of a court, some volunteers have wheelbarrowed sand up from the beach to mark out a court for the kids to use, not full size but just what is needed.

NetGo in Tonga has been introduced at every level of the village schools, which is a different approach to the other Pacific nations and whilst this has created new challenges, I believe this is why the principals fully support the programme.

Village number two court was marked by cones in long grass and the children who were there were ages eight and nine year old. This school has 28 teachers that were trained when we ran the NetGo Foundation course and the coach developers both help with the activities and support the coaches with their coaching.

At school three we arrived early; however, the children had all gone home for lunch. The principal gets in her car and picks up the children to get them back in time. She also supports the teacher who has trained to run extra sessions with the children each week. This is the school where Chris (who is with the peace core) is based for two years as part of his placement to create a programme that is sustainable once he leaves. He knew nothing about netball and did try to start basketball in Tonga, as being from America this is the game he knows. I am happy to say it fell flat and he has since trained as a foundation NetGo coach. He takes his role very seriously and he has his white board to show the children what he means if they don't understand him. This village is very lucky to have him.

School four had finished early for Mata Ma'a Tonga (Tongan Rugby League team game vs Australia) but the children were sitting waiting for our arrival, chasing the car as we came up the driveway. This school has the most trained coaches and run the programme at the same time for all age levels. Netball is carried out all on

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grass in bare feet, not quite enough equipment for the school, so there are some who are happy to wait patiently for their turn and let's just say, no behavioural issues here.

On Friday night we were invited to the Japanese Embassy for the launch of Radio Taiso. What I found interesting is the world's fascination with 'mindfulness'. The Japanese have been running this programme in Japan for 90 years. So why do we try and reinvent the wheel when this programme works perfectly?

On Saturday, Mata Ma'a Tonga day was a whole new level of crazy. It started with a 6.00 a.m. session and then an 8.30 a.m. session of 'kids-net', which is the Australian programme. This programme is drill based - one child working at a time. I can now see why moving to the NetGo programme in schools has been well received by the children but hard for the coaches to get their head around. This was hard for me to watch!!! Then the parade began and let's just say it stopped the town. It went on for over an hour and it wasn't just a team playing against the Australians. It was a nation who would 'Mate Ma'a Tonga' (Die for Tonga).

This second trip for me were long, full on days, but so rewarding to see schools full of children taking part in a programme that makes such a difference. It has no social boundaries and is creating such a community.

I am very privileged to be part of growing people through coach development, player development, master coaching, mentoring and anything else they ask for \bigcirc
